
THE CORPS.

Many departments of the School can register an advance during 1897, but none can record such a "boom" as the Corps.

Starting on the 1st of November, 1896, with a total of 179 of all ranks, we find that the numbers have increased by nearly a third and now stand at 236. During the year 79 have left and 136 have joined. That this is not a fictitious increase due to a desire to participate in the Jubilee Review is proved by the fact that the numbers are greater this term than last.

Moreover, this satisfactory increase has not been accompanied by any diminution of efficiency, and above all it has been accomplished without any pressure.

There have been the usual Field Days during the year, of which the last was the most satisfactory.

The great excitement of the year was of course the Jubilee, and a smart squad of 20 sappers under Lieut.
