At times the boat travels very fast. The second crew is considerably strengthened by Turner coming in to it, but the oars are not quite together yet. A good deal of work is done in the boat, and they should render a good account of themselves.

In the 3rd crew Bacon, bow, is rowing well, but does not keep his blade covered quite to the finish. Anderson is weak in body swing, Chambers is rowing hard though rather clumsily, Prynne does not finish the stroke out sufficiently.
