

**THE 'TARBUTT' PRIZE.**

In memory of Lieut. Charles A. P. Tarbutt, O.B., who died at Pretoria during the Boer War, his father, P. Tarbutt, Esq., presented to the School, through Mr T. P. Gordon Robinson, in whose house the boy was a boarder, the sum of £300 to establish a fund, the proceeds of which should be devoted annually to the purchase of a cup or cups to be the absolute possession of the recipients; the award to be made to the boy or boys who, in the opinion of those competent to judge, had done most during the current year to promote a healthy taste for physical exercise amongst the boys in the School.

**CHARACTERS OF THE VIII (with Averages).**

*Sergt. Glumicke* (59·07), a fairly consistent shot, though stress of work for his examination no doubt affected him occasionally. Captained his team well.

*Sergt. Gore* (58·06), good steady shot, brilliant at times. Would do even better with more control over his feelings.

*Sergt. Gordon* (57·06) came on rapidly late in the term; has plenty of nerve and shows good judgment. Should do great things next year.
