CAMBRIDGE LETTER.

Cambridge, June, 1906.

Dear Ousel,—When we should have broken the long silence, we do not know, if the great achievement of J. C. Wordsworth had not constrained us now. To take a place in the 2nd division of the 1st Class of the Classical Tripos, as Wordsworth has done, in one's 2nd year of residence, is a rare and distinguished thing. The other O.Bs at Cambridge have also passed their exams, some with honours—some without. Beside these feats of intellect prowess on the river pales into insignificance, and yet the School has been well represented in the May Races. D. G. Cherrington was stroking First Trinity 2nd Boat; the Magdalene VIII, captained by L. R. Pym, who is rowing 7, made three bumps, and is, we believe, going to Henley on the strength of them. C. T. Te Water was three in Christ's 1st boat; R. S. Hooker four in Emmanuel I.
