We are pleased to note the successes, at the recent Bisley Meeting, of the under-mentioned:—S. B. Unveiling of the Memorial Window (July 24.)

On the last Saturday afternoon of the Summer Term, Lieut. General Sir A. H. Paget, K.C.B., K.C.V.O., Commander-in-Chief, Eastern Command; unveiled, first the East window in the Grammar School Chapel, and later, the Memorial Tablets in the School Hall, which have been put up in memory of Old Boys of the School, who fell in the service of their country, from 1898 to 1902.

In the two quatrefoils at the head of the window are the arms of Edward VI. and Sir William Harper. There are six lights. The central light of the upper tier depicts our Saviour enthroned in glory; in those to the left and the right are the figures of St. Alban and St. George. The middle light of the lower three represents St. Michael quelling the Dragon; to the left is King Alfred, book in hand and holding a sword hilt upward in form of a cross, to the right the Black Prince. The general idea of the window is that of recalling the military heroes of national history and tradition.

The tablet beneath the window is of burnished gun metal and onyx, and bears the following inscription:—TO THE GLORY OF GOD AND IN MEMORY OF THE FOLLOWING OLD BOYS WHO DIED IN THE SERVICE OF THEIR COUNTRY, THE EAST WINDOW OF THIS CHAPEL IS REVERENTLY DEDICATED.
