F. R. Radice, winner of the King's Prize at Bisley last year, was top scorer for Oxford in the Humphry Inter-University Challenge Cup, on July 13th, and led his University to Victory.

'Spectator' has kindly supplied us with an answer to the question which we asked in our last issue. W. B. Weighell, of Jesus, who, like Grierson, was a bowler, played for Cambridge at Lord's in 1866, 1868, and 1869. He was a member of the Sussex County XI. from 1868-78, and won the R.H.S. medal for saving life in 1883. Mr. Weighell took Holy Orders, and after holding several cures, died as Vicar of Shilton, Faringdon, in 1905 —[Cp. *Ousel*, 284.]

E. A. Walker (1st VIII., 1909, 1910), rowed six for Twickenham Rowing Club in the Thames Cup, and after winning three heats, was beaten in the final.

H. C. B. Wemyss (1st VIII., 1908, 1909), rowed four for Royal Engineers in the Thames Cup, and after winning two heats, was beaten by the winners of the final.

C. E. Gunther rowed five for Trinity Hall, Cambridge (2nd crew) for the Thames Cup, but was beaten in the first round by the Royal Engineers,
