slide back and practically none of it gets on to the blade. If he can learn a rigid back he will be a very useful heavy weight next vear.

D. E. LOGAN (4 at Shrewsbury; 6 at Henley). The most improved and the best oar in the boat. Has always sat up high and had a good body swing, but this year has learnt to drive with his legs, and has cured his former bounce, which was a poor substitute for a smart but smooth recovery.

J. M. HOBBS (7). Drives well with his legs and has quite a fair body swing. Has made a good seven, but would have been even better if he could have cured his ugly finish done with rounded shoulders and dogseared elbows.

C. K. ROYLANCE (stroke). Rowed with quite fair length in practice, but when it came to racing, although he always displayed any amount of pluck, showed a bad inclination to get short at both ends of the stroke.

C. S. BAKER (cox). Had a difficult task when set to steer two races on strange rivers, and it is little to be wondered at that in neither case did he take his boat quite the shortest course. Always steered well on the home course and has a good idea of tonguing his crew.
