J. M. HOBBS (7). Drives well with his legs and has quite a fair body swing. Has made a good seven, but would have been even better if he could have cured his ugly finish done with rounded shoulders and dogs-eared elbows.

C. K. ROYLANCE (stroke). Rowed with quite fair length in practice, but when it came to racing, although he always displayed any amount of pluck, showed a bad inclination to get short at both ends of the stroke.

C. S. BAKER (cox). Had a difficult task when set to steer two races on strange rivers, and it is little to be wondered at that in neither case did he take his boat quite the shortest course. Always steered well on the home course and has a good idea of tonguing his crew.

Shooting Characters, 1914.

F. C. BAKER (58.89) Captain.—Has managed his team well, and though not in his last year's place in the averages, has shot consistently throughout. Has exercised a good influence on the School shooting during his captaincy.

R. L. WALKER (60.22) Vice-Captain.—Has shot well and consistently throughout the season. Is equally good away and at home.

D. M. HERIZSMITH (59.44).—A steady shot, who can always be relied upon. Is at his best in away matches. Showed fine form in practice at Bisley, and his being ineligible to shoot for the "Ashburton" was a great loss to the School.

E. MASTERS (57.78).—An erratic shot and a confirmed pessimist. Often shoots well and atones for his bad shots by exceptionally good ones. Has the making of a really fine shot if he will eradicate these faults.

R. WILLIAMS (58.86).—A good shot though inclined to be erratic. Should endeavour to discharge his shot at the correct moment. Too often does not know where his shot has gone.

R. YATES (58.33).—Has shot very well for his first season. Steady and reliable usually, he is too easily disconcerted, and at Colchester and in the "Country Life" Shield he was at his worst. Shot really well in the "Ashburton."

H. COOPER (54.14).—Has proved disappointing. When first he got in the team he shot really well, but has fallen off lately. Suffers from "nerves."

H. OATTS (54.11).—Has not maintained the promise of last season. Rather unsteady and inclined to be much ruffled by bad shots. Should cultivate a more even temper and greater steadiness.

M. CALDWELL (53.0).—Has improved greatly since last season and is keen. Failed rather at Bisley, probably through lack of experience. Should take more care over every shot and not trust so much to luck.
