WOODWORK.—Of work done in the School Workshop a box by Sadler, trays and boxes by Stewart, Messiter i, Gwynne, and Robson were most noticeable. Of the work done by sets that of C2 was the best. Some labels made by sets of the Junior School were good.

A table and book-slide, chip-carved by Alexander out of school, was a notable exhibit.

METAL WORK.—Some links, bolts, cold chisels, etc., made by boys in different Engineering sets were shown, the best work being that of M III1. A scribing-block made by Laidlaw was a good piece of work. Shells in various stages, partly made by boys were shown

boys, were shown.

Two collections of EGGs were shown. The larger was by L. J. Mothersill, which contained about seventy varieties, the great majority of which were in full clutches. The smaller collection, consisting of about sixty kinds, was by H. L. Black. This was displayed to considerably better advantage than the first, the eggs looking particularly well, packed as they were in pink wool.

The NATURAL HISTORY SECTION included two excellent sets of butterflies and moths, shown by Schofield and Barnes ii. Botany was well illustrated by Halsey's extensive and carefully-mounted collection of dried plants. Barnes ii showed also a well-arranged botanical collection, and the Junior School boys had several sets of dried leaves, which promise well for the future. The Scientific Society had large collections of rocks, minerals, fossils, shells, scientific photographs, skins, model aeroplanes, etc. The gem of the collection was a wasp's nest in mud from South America. This specimen of insect architecture is said to be the best one yet brought to England. Nunn showed a collection of rocks and fossils.

The CHEMICAL DEPARTMENT was represented by trays of crystals, prepared by the boys in Sets A and C. There were crystals of copper, sulphate made from the oxide and acid; iron sulphate from the metal and acid; ammonium oxalate from the alkali and acid; Epsom salts or magnesium sulphate from the carbonate and acid; and lead iodide from the acetate and potassium iodide.
