## CRICKET.

## Cricket Notes.

(By SPECTATOR).

We won our first School match quite easily. But Leys were weaker than usual, and their form in batting and fielding, especially the latter, was poor. The School, on the contrary, did good work in the field, and gave very little away. Our batsmen

often owed something to our opponents' bad catching. Davidson played the highest innings on the side. He drove hard, but was missed twice. Barnes and Baker were also successful. Baker has some excellent shots on the off-side, but his play on the leg-stump is almost unbelievably bad. Knowles and Davidson did well with the ball, and Knowles made the ball fly now and then in the way to gladden the heart of a fast bowler. The side showed themselves in the field hard-working rather than brilliant. Barnes and Kellett in the long field are good triers, though neither of them are real throwers. Baker, on the off-side, also deserves mention.

The M.C.C. side contained many names not unfamiliar to the School. However, this is the fault of the Test Match, and not of the visiting skipper. An interesting game resulted after all, the School being beaten after a good start. Why we did not get at least 250 after Bovell-Jones and Bailey had put up 95 for the first wicket, it is hard to say. But there was some very weak batting on an excellent wicket. Kellett and Baker were both out through playing back to half-volleys. The saying that it is vain to lay a net in the sight of any bird evidently does not apply to some of the Eleven, for Davidson, Wardle, and Weir all walked into Dr. Gibson's off-side trap, which was very obviously set for them. We must do better next time.

We commend unreservedly to all boy cricketers the articles on the game now appearing in P. F. Warner's new magazine, "The Cricketer." The chapters on batting by D. J. Knight are especially worthy of study by all young cricketers who mean to learn the game; those by A. C. Maclaren on present-day faults are equally instructive, and indeed offer a reasonable explanation of our present disasters in Test Match cricket.
