GOD SAVE THE KING.

Mr. Sanderson and Mr. Lejeune.

At Speech Day the Head Master announced the retirement of Mr. H. K. St. J. Sanderson, who for thirty-eight years has taught the Sixth Form of the School, and of Mr. F. Lejeune, who has been French Master here for thirty years.

We are indebted to the Editor of *The Bedfordshire Times* for permission to reprint portions of an article on the careers of these two Masters.

"Mr. H. K. St. John Sanderson is a native of Warwick, and scion of a family that has produced schoolmasters, doctors, and lawyers in the course of its traditional descent from Bishop Sanderson, of Lincoln, whose life was written by Izaak Walton. He was educated at Shrewsbury School and was there head boy. He went up to Cambridge in 1833, and took his degree in 1836, having been in the First Class in Part I. of the Classical Tripos, and having also gained Sir William Browne's Medal for Latin Epigram.

"After a period spent in coaching for the Army at a private establishment at Clifton in the 'palmy days of cramming,' Mr. Sanderson was appointed in 1890 by Mr. J. S. Phillpotts to the staff of Bedford School, where he has taken the Sixth Form from the first. At that time the School was in its old quarters, where it had been since the days of Sir William Harper—in St. Paul's Square, and the Sixth Form met in the 'Boarders' Hall,' but soon afterwards, owing to the rapid growth of the numbers in the School, accommodation had to be sought where it could be found, and Forms were even taught in a room under the platform of the Corn Exchange. Mr. Sanderson saw the events and changes incidental to the migration from the old building to the new in 1891, and was present in
