Old Bedfordians' Cricket Club.

A letter has been sent to O.B.s interested in cricket, with a view to stimulating interest in O.B. Week Cricket. The response so far has been encouraging, but if any O.B.s have been overlooked, who would like to support this appeal, their subscriptions or donations will be gratefully acknowledged by the Hon. Secretary, Bedford Sub-Committee.

"Dear Sir,
 "During the past few years the financial position of the O.B.s' Club has suffered, consequent on the falling off of those new members on whom the Club is entirely dependent for revenue, and, on that account, last year the Bedford Sub-Committee, which is responsible for the O.B. Week, forwarded a recommendation to the Executive Committee suggesting that, as the cricket matches absorb about £35 annually, the fixtures be limited to three days only, *i.e.*, a match *v.* The Masters and another *v.* The School. This recommendation was accepted by the Executive Committee, but the Cricket representative was empowered to arrange matches for the remaining days, provided the expenses were met by the players.

"As each match costs approximately £6, it was found that a number of younger players could not
