## The Assault-at-Arms.

The Easter Term's activities, as usual, culminated in the Assault-at-Arms, when the Gym. Club entertained a large and appreciative gathering in the Great Hall. The programme opened with a display on the horizontal bar; even the most undiscerning spectator soon realised that the standard of gymnastics was unusually high this year; this impression was confirmed when Rustomji performed the longarm swing, or "Grand Circle," a feat which has only twice been achieved in the previous twenty years. The Preparatory School then made an attractive contribution to the performance, and performed their physical exercises with smartness and celerity. They were followed by four squads of acrobats, who scrambled up ropes and suspended themselves in strange postures in mid-air, while spectators held their breath with nervous apprehension.

The first competitive event was the fencing. Here the Boarders, represented by Haynes and Palmer won the foils, but the Day Boys (Passfield and Gerrard) had their revenge with the sabres.

During the interval the Head Master, assisted by M Cook i, the Captain of Gym., distributed the prizes and Challenge Cups; he paid a warm tribute to the successful work of R.S.M. Whitelaw and Ser geant Jackson, and referred to the unbroken series of victories which our Gym. Team had gained in School contests during the past few years.

In the second half of the programme the most popular item was the Non-stop Relay Boxing Match between eight-a-side teams of Boarders and Day Boys. The art of self-defence had no part in this event. Each pair occupied the ring for one minute, and at the blast of a whistle another pair sprang in to continue the fight. At the conclusion, when the storm of applause had subsided, the referee announced the result as follows: Day Boys, 13 points; Boarders, 10 points.

## Athletics.

### Triangular Match.

The triangular match with Charterhouse and Lancing took place at Charterhouse on Saturday, March 23rd, and resulted in a tie between the School and Charterhouse, with 10 points each, Lancing being third with 4 points. The fine weather, which had been a feature of the previous week, completely broke down, and the conditions were all against good performances. A strong wind blew straight across the field, bringing with it frequent showers of rain. Once again, superiority in the more technical field events counterbalanced an inferiority in track events, though it is only fair to note that for the first time in the history of this match we were not last in the 3 Miles Relay, and that, but for a faulty baton exchange in the 660 yards Relay, we should have been second, and possibly first. The result of the match depended on the last event—the Onemile Relay—the position being that we had to be second to be sure of winning, and that Charterhouse had to be first to tie with us.
